This summer has produced practically epidemic proportions of a relatively common and often times disturbing and misunderstood disease. Along the East Coast and very probably throughout the U. S. tracheobronchitis, better known as "kennel cough", has affected most kennels and a very high percentage of the dog population. In years past the disease had been occurring sporadically but this year apparently weather factors and other contributing factors have been ideal for the propagation of this infection.

This disease is believed to be due to a virus. In most cases, after the animal is affected by the virus, secondary bacterial infection occurs. This combination of virus and bacteria produce the typical case of this disease. It is suspected that "carriers" of the disease exist without clinical symptoms since infections have occurred in kennels and hospitals where the most scrupulous care is taken to prevent admitting animals with any signs of infectious disease.

The constant and outstanding symptom is a cough characterized by a short, dry "hack" or by a series of such coughs. At its height, the cough may be uncontrollable. It is aggravated by excitement or exercise. It is deep, persistent and unproductive although occasionally a small amount of mucus is expectorated, causing the owner to think the dog is trying to vomit. A dog afflicted with this type of respiratory disease is presented for examination usually because the owner thinks that the dog has a bone in his throat. Usually there is no fever but if so it is slight.

Dogs with tracheobronchitis usually show no signs of disease other than the coughing. The appetite remains good; there is no evidence of ocular or nasal discharge; and the animal is in good spirits. The onset of the disease is sudden, with no preliminary symptoms. Usually gentle pressure or rubbing over the throat and neck will induce coughing. The highly infectious nature of the disease will leave little doubt in the mind of one who encounters the disease in a kennel. Should one dog with symptoms of tracheobronchitis be introduced, within 5 to 10 days

1. FDSB Recognized Trials.

3. Report of win must be made to David J. Stem within 1 month of win, or not eligible.
4. Responsibility of dog owner to get in report and owner must be a member of NRSETC in good standing.
5. Report of top 6 dogs to be published in Whip each month.
- *6. Points to be figured by following base figure.
 - A. For Irish Setters Only and for Restricted Breed Stakes:
 - (1.) Shooting Dog or All-Age Wins: 1st-5, 2nd-4, 3rd-3.
 - (2.) Derby Wins: 1st-4, 2nd-3, 3rd-2.
 - (3.) Puppy Wins: 1st-3, 2nd-2, 3rd-1.
 - B. For All-Breed Stakes:
 - (1.) Shooting Dog or All-Age Wins: 1st-10, 2nd-8, 3rd-6.
 - (2.) Derby Wins: 1st-8, 2nd-6, 3rd-4.
 - (3.) Puppy Wins: 1st-6, 2nd-4, 3rd-2.
 - C. For National Red Setter Championship:
 - (1.) If Champion named Champion - 15 Runner-up-10.
 - (2.) If title withheld, winner declared Winner-10 Runner-up-8.
7. Award to be made at annual Spring trial in April. Rotating trophy with permanent award to be kept by owner.

I received a letter that was written by a young fellow from Texas, Carl Wiseman, Jr., and he submitted a couple of questions that he would like to have answered. Carl is just starting out with his first Bird Dog and has just joined the Texas Red Setter Club and the NRSFTC. Here are his questions and my answers. I hope that they fill the bill.

Question: What affects if any will the over-use of a check cord have on a young dog, and how severely should the cord be used in the way of discipline or punishment?

Answer: The check cord can be a very useful tool, and I can't name a man that trains dogs without it's use. But the check cord can in turn be as destructful as it is useful if used improperly. The individual I dog will be a form of yardstick as to the type of training he should receive. Some of the dogs that I've worked with will respond to voice displeasure, and other dogs have to be disciplined rather severely. In my opinion, I like to take the soft approach, and then check the results. If this method fails, I can always go to the tough, or disciplinary approach. By reversing the order, there is every possibility that a good dog may be ruined.

Let's go into the various uses of the check cord. It's a means of control or restraint. A dog can be led, roaded, or whoa'd, at the trainers command. I like to put a cord on a young pup and lead him out by my pheasant pens. If the pup styles up on point, sometimes the slight pressure of the cord will steady him. In the field, I let young Derby's and puppies drag a cord, if the dog goes on point, again you have a manner in which you can restrain or steady it. Unless a dog is really aggressive, and is continually "Busting" his birds, I try not to do any excessive jerking or yanking on the cord. I do not use any "Choke" or "Spiked" collars, and abhor the use of a "Shock" collar. One of the most pitiful sights in the world, is the sight of a fine Bird Dog that is doing his job in a cowed or slinking manner. I am a fairly new hand at Dog Training in comparison to a lot of others, but I am proud of the rapport that I have with my dogs, and in the way that they will handle for me. I also have a new system that

MR. CASEY

A fine old Irishman, Mr. Casey, (From Kansas City; Mo. Star) farm near Osage City where he had been in retirement five years. Mr. Casey was fifteen years old at the time of his passing. For the first ten years of his Irish setter life, he won 31 trophies for Mr. and Mrs. Tom Likely of Independence. He also found hundreds of birds for Likely on hunting trips.

Mr. Casey as a big boned, wide running Irishman, who with the late Shawn of Dee Johnson and Whirlaway of Henry Taylor helped make local Irish setter history.

The Likelys raised Mr. Casey from a puppy. Through him they got interested in field trials and the Santa Caligon Irish Setter club. Likely campaigned him hard for ten years, and Mr. Casey ran with the best of them in trials.

Likely named the lanky puppy Casey. Mrs. Likely said that "It didn't sound dignified enough, let's make it Mr. Casey." That's how he got his name, although there was nothing dignified about Mr. Casey when he went into action. Then he was a brush-bustlin' fence-jumping whirlwind in the field.

Five years ago he injured a hind leg which took away his drive. He was retired from field trials. But Mr. Casey still wanted to go hunting. He had a bad habit of going out on U.S. 71 by-pass and trying to flag down drivers of station wagons. He associated station wagons with hunting trips.

Lest he get hit on the highway, the Likelys sent him to a farm of a friend, where Mr. Casey could roam at will and help with the management of the farm. Mr. Casey was a take-over dog. He ran things his way-right up to the end.

He was a fine Irishman. Around the house, the Likely kids wooled him hard and he took it good naturedly. In the field, he found birds for Likely; in trials he won his share of placements and left a legacy of trophies. May he rest in peace.

Red Setters over the years. Many of the pictures came from Roger Boser and some from Larry Ludt who clipped them from the Am. Field. They came out well. The club president remarked to me later that he hears some fellows who have been going afield with bench-bred plugs say that they had better find out a bit more about their own breed. I remain convinced that most persons who want an Irish Setter that can hunt never are exposed to the facts about Red Setters and they and the Red Setter Cause are the losers.

D. J. Garman of the Texas Red Setter Club wrote that their trial was a huge success with 62 entries. None of their Red Setters placed in the all-breed competition but at least the Texas folk now know of the club's existence, objective, and determination. Don appreciates Bill Gargo getting our trial announcements out early, he was able to reschedule his vacation and will be at Killdeer, with his wife, on Nov. 8-9 for their first National and will be running a Puppy and Derby.

Looks as if the Puppy stake will have a lot of competition. Roger Boser's Buddwing has been making himself known in Penna. and N.J. all-breed stakes - placing each time. Took first at Happy Valley English Setter Club trial in Medford, N.J. Several other wins were published in last week's Am. Field. In fact, about every trial report in that issue that listed an Irish entered he also placed. That's the way to go!

Appreciated the card from David Hasinger from Iran. He sure does get around. One of the trial reports mentioned above showed a Valli HI female winning, handled by Dave Grubb.

It's hard to keep up with County Clare McKenna's wins. Al and Fran Rogers are running him every weekend in all-breed Derbys in the South and he places each time. We'll let you read of his performance in the Field trial reports. Enough to say that he has had at least 2 firsts and now totals 283 points for the Duke trophy. Incidentally, since so many in the Tri-State (Ala., Tenn., Ga.) circuit have become followers of Mac, Fran is going to solicit votes for Askew Carolina Lady in the next Hall of Fame nominations, using Mac as ex-

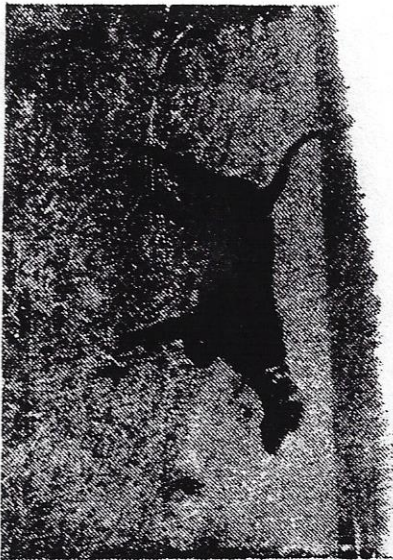

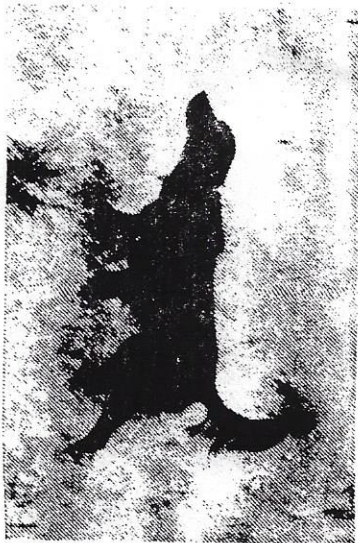

Hobo Sal is offering a litter of pups bred properly I would say. I only hope that all those at our trial realized that it takes both the breaks and the good dog. I would say pretty nearly everyone who answered my letters knew their dog's faults, as well as their good points. Look for your dog's faults, the judges can see them if you can not.

Timmy Baby Bean with 18 wins: 7 are 1st, 6 are 2nd and 5 are thirds. Ten of Timmy Baby Bean placements are in open all breed competition. One of her best wins, a second place against 26 Pointers 5 Irish and 1 Brittany, is certainly a good big win. She is eight years old. She is of Ardee breeding and not at all related to our present day winners. Her owner plans to breed her when her field trial career is over. (It must be soon if she's eight years old.) He knew his dog and he knew her faults. Bob Harrison gave her handler, Jim Barnes, the credit for finishing her. Dale Bruns also gave his trainer, Gen Lusford, credit for his work with Sal.

Miss Colleen of Kaymar, trained by Ed Schmettler, and also owned by a man that appreciated his dog's trainer. This is a dog to watch. Her pedigree has really got my fancy. Auntum Hills Duke, Mr. O'Leary appearing three times, and Askew Carolina Lady at least 5 times. She only weighs 37 lbs. in top condition. She did not appear at the National because she was heavy with pups. (See her this fall.)

I've worked out with a degree of success, that enables me to "Steady a dog to Shot and Wing" without the use of a check cord. This system, as with all others is not 100% but it is working well for me.

Question: Is there a way to make my dog range further?

Answer: Here again it depends on the individual dog. Is the dog physically capable of running faster. This is an inherited trait and cannot be altered. Is the dog putting all he's got into the effort, or is he puttering and even playing. Desire is a wonderful stimulant, and game contact will often start a puppy to chase. When the pup gets the idea that it's fun to run and find game, he will often start to range further. A pup that has the ability to run and hunt can be helped by running it with another dog, a wide ranging one. Having a pup or dog in good physical condition will have a real effect on it's range and application in the field. Some of the Major Circuit trainers "Whip Train," this means that a dog is chased, by men and horses, and if he loiters, he is given a couple of good swats with a buggy whip. This is a severe form of training and should be reserved for the extremely lazy dog. Dogs have excellent memories, and will often return to a spot that held a covey of birds. I've had dog's that went and hunted out a spot where they had found birds the previous hunting season. I often will put a Quail Box or a planted bird, at the furthest part of my area. Many of the dogs at my kennel will race at top speed to check and see if there are any birds at this familiar location. If you put the birds in a so-called "Birdy" spot the dogs will be encouraged to seek objectives and you are increasing his knowledge and ability as well as increasing his range. In short I would say that the dog and his ability is the main concern, but that the foregoing and other similar methods, should be helpful.

Autumn Hills Penny, the top bitch in Duke Trophy standings, certainly is a great individual. She is at the top of the list this year with 381 points reported in June standings, and she won it with 233 points last year.

There is a real contest on and a challenge to all. We must realize the value of these wins, especially in mixed competition. By starting off in the N.R.S.F.T.C. trials with a large field, we really get a measurement of the quality of dogs we are breeding.

The male is more important than the female, as an aid to the breed, because of the greater number of offspring he can have. However, it is the brood bitch who really can create a line. A bitch that clicks with several good studs will, through her sons, help the breed. I wonder if there is another Askew Carolina Lady in these top bitches. We will never know if we do not use them for breeding.

Please drop me a line about your best producing bitch or bitches. I would really like to look into that phase of our breeding.

Take the 5 top Duke Trophy animals and see how they measure up to pointers or setters in the trials in which they place. If you went out and bought a pointer, and knew no more than you did when you bought your field bred Irishmen, would you have done any better? I doubt it. First of all you probably got closer to the Irishman because you had a greater challenge.

The good shooting dog only has to please his master. The field trial dog has to please the judges. The judges are men who see lots and lots of good dogs and are looking for the best. They love the sport.

I feel the only measure of a good dog is in mixed competition, but I still think the breed trials are good. They bring the winners and the breeders together to see what is asked of a good dog and how their own dogs measure up to the others.

When a fellow says his own dog is good, but sees his or her faults, he is in a position to help the breed. My opinion of my own dogs is of no value. The opinion of field trial judges pups I sell is of no value. The opinion of field trial judges is the only one that counts. It is the only unbiased opinion

most of the dogs will be coughing. Young dogs are especially susceptible.

The outlook for a dog with this disease is usually very favorable. The disease seems to run a mild, self-limiting course lasting from several days to several weeks. Most cases would recover without any treatment but treatment is usually recommended to speed the recovery process and insure that no complications develop. Treatment usually involves the use of antibiotics and cough-depressants.

I have been getting very few questions regarding health problems or anything related that I could possibly present information on. If any readers have any specific question or topic they are interested in contact me.
