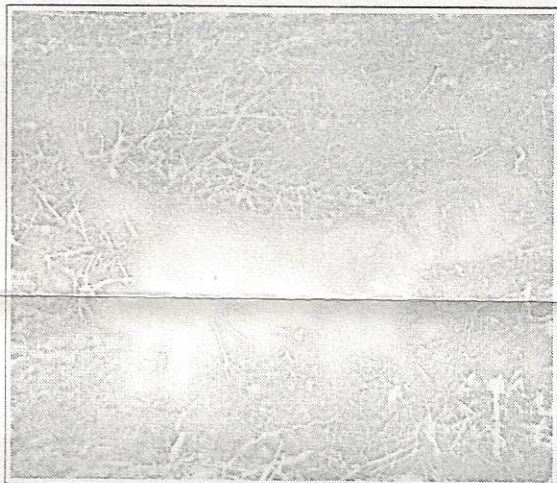

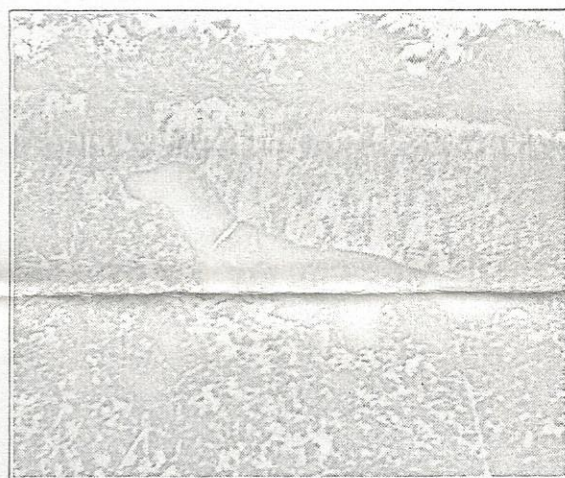

Tippy Tipperary McKerry was the winner, but only by the proverbial frog hair. Tippy bored into the cover with the ambition of an honest shooting dog and quartered the alfalfa fields like a good pheasant dog should; her ground work was more than sufficient. Once in the birdfield she quickly found and pointed, at the flush and shot not a word was uttered; a perfectly finished bird dog. Soon, a second bird—again perfect manners.

Cedar Bluff Paddy covered the course in an equally pleasing manner and her bird score was two finds. Both birds were handled flawlessly, although her handler did not seem to have absolute confidence in her steadiness. On both points Paddy leaned into the scent with anticipation, but was cautioned and never relaxed.

Sharon treated to a laudable effort on the back course and when the gallery rode over the last hill before entering the birdfield, she formed a part of a pulse-tingling picture. On the pine studded slope Sharon was locked up on point and Moreover Mike, quite some distance away, was backing, both dogs displaying high-headed intensity. As the handlers moved in, the bird moved off, both dogs breaking and making quick efforts to pin the runner. Mike got too close and gave a short chase when the gaudy cock jumped, but Sharon stayed for the shot.

Willow Winds Bessie did not find; Seamus Red Tuxedo crowded two birds; Playgirl's Holiday delivered a nice shooting dog race; Rusty's was scored with a delayed chase; Askew's Carolina Lady was credited with a picture point, handled, then got too close to a second bird and hard to stop. High Point Flame worked her ground well; Willow Winds Jack with the best shooting dog race of the program, caught a sopping wet, weak flying hen; Shelley's Red Sugar was still up to her old tricks—fast on the back course and very fast on the chase; Padriack Reddeman's Jill Ann impressed.
