First in the Midwestern Red Setter Open Championship

Field Trial Club's Midwestern Open Championship fell victim to this particular one. Run over the well-known grounds at Delaware Dam, O., April 23-24, the stakes suffered greatly in quality and clean bird work because of the soaring temperatures and cloudless skies.

Birds there were aplenty, and entries in a goodly Birds there were aplenty, and entries in a goodly number, but neither birds nor entries were inclined to behave their best when the temperatures soared to near-record highs and hit 85-87° on the two days of running. Cover so tinder-dry that smoking was prohibited on the courses also was noisy enough to give the running pheasants plenty of chance to move

give the running pheasants plenty of chance to move out before clean bird work could be accomplished.

Fyn, Irish setter dog, owned and handled by Frank Nielsen of Berea, O., paid the price for the vagaries of the weather, for while he was winning first in the National's Midwestern Open Championship has was unable to preduce eneagh clean foult. ship, he was unable to produce enough clean, fault-less bird work to give the judges fair cause to grant the championship. He was declared winner of the stake on the basis of two good, clean finds, but was stake on the basis of two good, clean finds, but was also charged with an unproductive and a stop to flush during his hour. Fyn is a perennial winner in shooting dog stakes and possesses an excellent nose and more than a little bird sense, but, as in this stake, loses much on point through the misfortune of a broken tail that prevents a really classic stance on his hirds

Runner-up was Ned LeGrande's winning import, Sulhamsted Norse D'Or. Shane, as he is known, had more game contacts than any other dog in the stake, but was also victim of jittery, wild-flushing or run-ning birds. Both winner and runner-up handled at all times, Fyn the more consistent in his pattern and Shane the wider of the two and showing well to the front.

Necessity of moving the annual Midwestern meet to a date later than usual was created when con-flicts for use of the grounds made it necessary for the Red Setter Club to give up the traditional date of the second weekend in April and move to the final one. It was apparent from the start of the supporting stakes on Saturday that no handler expected

ing stakes on Saturday that no handler expected to show his entry at best, regardless of the fact that the Delaware Dam venue is one of the finest in the country. The same feeling carried over to the start of the Championship on Sunday.

As in the past, the Central Ohio Bird Dog Club was host to the trial, and it can bear repeating that the members of this organization make a trial successful by their diligence and devotion. They gave over their club, stables and kennel facilities to the visitors and put forth every effort to make the trial visitors and put forth every effort to make the trial a good one. In this particular renewal a special vote of thanks was directed to John C. Cramer, who, in addition to spending two days in the judicial saddle, also busied himself with horses and assisted with other arrangements, and Mack Triplett, who ably marshaled the stakes and diligently kept the event running smoothly.



MIDWESTERN RED SETTER OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP



THE RUNNING

Minutes later he had another find on pheasant, manners exemplary. Near half-way point he froze again, but handler was unable to produce. At 49 minutes, Fyn hesitated, stopped, and bird went out wild ahead. He remained steady to be shot over and was sent on, finishing with his consistent pattern. His manners were excellent.




