National Walking Shooting Dog Futurity

THE McDonald Sportsmen Association once again hosted the National Walking Shooting Dog Futurity for its 22nd renewal. The trial went off without a hitch with the help of everyone involved.

Outgoing Secretary/Treasurer Jeff Crum was on hand to get the dogs on the line, make sure the judges were fed and all the other intricacies that allow for a smooth trial. This will be Jeff's last year in this position due to work and family commitments. His involvement will be missed. Before the announcements his years of service were recognized by a hearty round of applause from everyone in attendance.

Incoming Secretary/Treasurer Roger McPherson was also on hand to announce the braces and help out wherever he could. Roger also provided mounts for the judges.

Pennsylvania Walking Shooting Dog Association President Joe Cammisa was on hand to collect entries and ferried dogs back and forth with the help of Al McKinney. Jeff Angott and Doug McMillen provided help in the bird planting department.

Judges for this event were Steve Swauger of Reynoldsville, Pa., and Russ Richardson of Guys Mills, Pa. Both men have a wealth of bird dog experience and knew what they were looking at. They gave each dog their undivided attention with no idle chitchat to deter from the task at hand. Their decisions were well received.

Last, but certainly not least, the very generous support of Purina must be commended, along with that of representative Pat Lamantia.

These grounds allow a judge to see a dog, making class and range high priorities in selecting the winners.

Spring had sprung early this year in much of Pennsylvania, however, and McDonald was no exception posing difficult conditions for many a young dog. The spring foliage provided a change of landscape that seemed to affect scenting conditions with more dogs going birdless than in recent years. Add to that the nesting killdeer and larks that would swoop down enticing many a dog to provide a merry chase either behind or far off course.

The Futurity drew 27 dogs from 34 eligible litters; 25 contenders came to the line. There was a strong field with 10 of the 27 dogs having placed in Futurity competitions earlier in the season. Many others were names familiar from the pages of The American Field. Professionals Dave Hughes, Marc and Scott Forman and Garry Malzone brought some of the best young dogs on their strings.

THE WINNERS

This Futurity strives to identify dogs that can go on to win walking shooting dog stakes. The winners this year certainly seem to fit the bill.

Backcountry Sid the Kid emerged victorious from the 10th brace. Those in attendance knew that after this brace a new bar had been set that would prove to be unequaled. This well built pointer was bred by Frank Joyal of Fairfax, Vt., and is owned and handled by Chris

Cantanzarite of Scenery Hill, Pa. Right off the breakaway Sid proved his manners with a stylish back of his bracemate's barren stand. From there Sid went bird hunting in a merry fashion and always forward. His four finds (one divided) were more than any other dog in the stake and he did it with advanced manners and high style. His race filled the country but was coupled with the cooperation needed for the walking handler.

This win also showed Sid's versatility as he had placed in the National (horseback) Shooting Dog Futurity under the whistle of Mike Tracy in October, 2011.

In the 9th brace, Marc Forman handled Shady Hills Billie Too to the second spot. Billie is a very appealing young setter. He was fast, fleet footed and his tail cracked in high style every step of the way. Billie had two well spaced finds with loftiness, tail ramrod straight.

This was Billie's second Futurity placement as well, having placed in the International Cover Dog Futurity the week before. The breeder of record is Robert Grassi of Washington, Pa., who was in attendance. Mike Cooper of Spencer, Ohio is Billie's owner.

The third place dog gave something to strive for in the 4th brace. Swank's Cello was handled by Dave Hughes and is owned by Rollin Swank of Graysville, Pa., who walked the brace. This setter female grabbed your attention with every stride. She ran with much animation and handled kindly while hunting

the country. At 20 she connected right of course showing breathtaking style. A wet bird proved to be a little too much temptation at the flush but Cello showed acceptable Derby manners. Those who follow the circuit closely felt this was a well deserved win as Cello had been knocking on the door in several large Derby stakes recently. Kevin Klein is the breeder of record.

The final placement went to A Carolina Shadow for handler-breeder Garry Malzone. Joe, as he is called, ran a huge race with his rough handle at times being one of the separators. Shortly into the brace Joe stopped in a known bird location but unfortunately the bird could not be produced on this stand. Sent on Joe opened back up, pointing on hillside far to the front. Malzone hurried to the find, still taking several minutes to arrive nonetheless. Joe held, however, showing advanced manners at the flight. Sent on he had one more stop left of course correcting on his own and finishing to the front. John Roswech of Chester, N. J., is the owner of record.

Other dogs with commendable performances: Freezeway and Pine Straw Blackhawk. Grouse River Black Jack also had the judges sitting high in the saddle but failed to connect with game.

Splitting the littermates was the well built pointer female K G B for handler Al McKinney. She runs with a powerful

stride and plenty of class.

With Al McKinney and Jeff Angott in the judicial saddles for the Open Shooting Dog, one handler took two spots. Dave Blakley of Sykesville, Pa., took home the blue with Timberdoodle Hobo which filled the country with style and range. Showing polished manners on his game this young shooting dog shows he has a bright future.
